## **Academic Advising**

<u>CLASS Advising Definition:</u> Academic advising is a collaborative partnership and developmental process that assists students in defining, clarifying and achieving academic, personal, and career goals.

<u>Mission of the Dean's Office for Undergraduates and Student Advising:</u> The office mission is to teach, assist and empower students to define, clarify and achieve academic and personal goals through professional, caring service.

## Student's Responsibilities:

- Schedule regular appointments and stay in contact with your advisor each semester.
- Become knowledgeable about college programs, policies, and procedures. Use the catalog and schedule of classes!
- Clarify your personal values and goals and provide your advisor with accurate information regarding your interests and abilities.
- Come prepared to each appointment with questions or material for discussion. Ask questions if you
  do not understand an issue or have a specific concern.
- Complete all assignments or recommendations from your advisor and gather all relevant decisionmaking information. Accept responsibility for your decisions.
- Be aware of degree requirements and how/where to access them. Utilize your unofficial online audit.
- Be aware of your rights under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).
- Respond to all official UNT correspondence directed specifically to you.
- Although some students are required to meet with their advisor every semester, all students are
  encouraged to do so. Declared majors have faculty advisors available in their academic departments
  in addition to the professional advising staff in the Dean's Office for Undergraduates and Student
  Advising.

## **Advisor Responsibilities:**

- Listen, communicate effectively, and establish a connection with each student.
- Actively listen to all questions and concerns and take steps to provide support.
- Deliver streamlined resources in a user-friendly format.
- Maintain confidentiality and adhere to FERPA.
- Provide information and assist in academic planning.
- Effectively communicate and explain institutional policies, procedures, deadlines, curriculum, general education requirements, and academic programs.
- Refer students to appropriate campus resources.
- Keep knowledge and skill set current.

## Advisors in the College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences

**CLASS Professional Academic Advisors & Counselors -** work in conjunction with Departmental or Faculty Advisors. Academic Advisors assist students with chosen majors in answering questions concerning general University Core and College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences and Mayborn School of Journalism requirements. They are available to review official degree audits and perform graduation checks with students. They also review all situations requiring Dean's Office Approval for Liberal Arts and Social Sciences Undergraduate Students (such as Concurrent Enrollment, Overload, and Pass/No Pass Course Option approvals.)

**Departmental/Faculty Advisors** - work in conjunction with Academic Advisors, mentor students in their academic discipline, help them understand requirements in their major, career options related to that major, and the process for obtaining an official degree audit.

Take Flight: CLASS First Year Advising – first year students only. If you are starting at UNT after high school graduation, you are part of the Take Flight program! We call you our CLASS-Y Scholars. You are invited to use the CLASS-Y Scholar Lounge in GAB 207 as a study-spot and hub for Academic Advising. Take Flight has dedicated Academic Counselors who will meet with you during your first year at UNT for individual appointments, specialized academic workshops, and events.

#### **How To Request An Official Degree Audit**

A degree audit is an official document of the University that lists all the courses needed to complete a chosen degree and shows how all the courses completed are applied toward the degree. Students should request an official degree audit at orientation when they meet with their faculty or staff academic advisor. An advisor will notify a student when their official degree audit is complete via their UNT email address. Students can view their degree audit on-line at <a href="maybegreeaudit.unt.edu">mydegreeaudit.unt.edu</a>.

If you were not able to request an official degree audit at orientation, set up an appointment with your academic advisor to request your official degree audit. See the top of the page for how to schedule an appointment.

#### **Graduation Check**

Students should request an appointment for a graduation check with their advisor in the Dean's Office for Undergraduate and Student Advising during the semester prior to their final semester. While it is recommended that students set up an appointment with their advisor for a graduation check, students may run their audit at mydegreeaudit.unt.edu or request a printed copy of their degree audit in GAB 220 at any time.

## **Graduation Application**

The graduation application may be accessed through the Student Homepage under Academic Records on my.unt.edu. In order to apply for graduation, students should:

- Submit graduation application by the deadline stated on the Registrar's Office website.
- Enroll for all courses stated on the degree audit within the course load guidelines.
- Must have a minimum overall grade point average of 2.0 on all attempted course work at UNT.
- Must have a minimum overall grade point average of 2.0 on all coursework attempted (transfer and UNT combined).
- Not be concurrently enrolled at any other institution.

## Teacher Education Certification 940-565-2051 - https://coe.unt.edu/educator-preparation-office

Students wishing to teach at the secondary level must meet certification requirements through the College of Education. To be admitted to the teacher certification program in the College of Education (MATT 119), the student must first have at least 60 semester hours, a 2.75 UNT GPA, a 2.75 overall GPA, and an official degree audit. To apply, students should go to the College of Education application webpage, and submit their application before the August or January deadlines. Students will also need to apply for their Early Field Experience coursework no less than one calendar year of Student Teaching. All students must pass a state exam to be certified as a teacher in the state of Texas. The exam covers Professional Development (teaching methodology) and the subject areas being certified.
