Carmen Terry: Principal Lecturer of German

In summer 2016, Carmen Terry, principal lecturer, organized and directed a program at the Albert Ludwig University of Freiburg (founded in 1457), and had the opportunity to meet German students of their own age and interests. This was a very enjoyable and educational experience for them, and the majority of the students from this group, declared German as a major or a minor upon their return. Among other attractions, the group visited Heidelberg, where the oldest German university is located. They also traveled to Strasbourg in Alsace-Lorraine in France, and to Lucerne in Switzerland. Strasbourg still preserves a strong German presence, and students could learn more about the history and culture of this place. Professor Terry has directed the summer study abroad to Germany since 2007. The first location of the program was in Leipzig, and in 2013, it moved to Freiburg.
