Dr. Geoffrey Wawro

Dr. Geoffrey D. W. Wawro is Director of the Military History Center at UNT. He received his undergraduate degree in History from Brown University, his Master's in European History and Philosophy from Yale University, and his Ph.D. in Modern European History from Yale University. He has written five books, and is in progress with his sixth book titled *The Silent Slain: The Forgotten American Soldiers Who Defeated German in World War I*. He has written over 60 scholarly and policy articles, and chapters. Since he began his career, he has received over 30 prizes, awards, grants and fellowships for his work. He once worked as a Credit Analyst at World Banking Group, and starred as a History Channel anchor from 2000-2009.



Dr. Jennifer Wallach

Dr. Jennifer Jensen Wallach is an associate professor of history who teaches courses about African American history and food history. She is the author or editor of eight books including *Closer to the Truth than Any Fact: Memoir, Memory, and Jim Crow* and *Dethroning the Deceitful Pork Chop: Rethinking African American Foodways from Slavery to Obama*. She also coedits the University of Arkansas Press book series Food and Foodways and is an editor for the journal *History Compass*.



Dr. Kathryne Beebe

Dr. Kathryne Beebe is an historian of late-medieval pilgrimage and religious culture, as well as a specialist in the Digital Humanities. Before joining UNT, she taught at the University of Texas at Arlington, Southeast Missouri State, and the University of Oxford, where she held fellowships at St. Hilda's College and Balliol College. Her first book, *Pilgrim & Preacher: the Audiences and Observant Spirituality of Friar Felix Fabri (1437/8-1502)*, was published by Oxford University Press in 2014. Her second monograph will focus on virtual pilgrimage (for travelers who journeyed only in the imagination) and Observant religious reform in medieval Europe. She is also directing or engaged with several Digital Humanities projects, including *The Digital Observance Network*.
