
ADVANCED ELECTIVES



Students seeking a Bachelor's degree need 42 advanced hours to graduate.

If you do not meet this number with the required courses in your major, minor or core, then you will need something called advanced electives to help satisfy this requirement.

These are courses at the **3000 or 4000** level that you get to choose.

- Look for courses that do not require any prerequisites that you have not completed.
- Stay away from courses that are for majors only.
- Choose courses that interest you and can broaden your knowledge base.

Using the Search steps shown on the left, you can search for courses that are being offered in the upcoming term that are currently available. To ensure you are meeting the pre-requisites for a course, you can check course descriptions at catalog.unt.edu.
